I. What is waiting for the LORD?

A. Waiting for the LORD is the description a heart that trusts the LORD

- 1. Ps. 33:20 Our soul waiteth for the LORD: He is our help/shield
- 2. Ps. 62:1 Truly my soul waiteth upon God: from Him cometh all my salvation
- 3. Ps. 130:6 My soul waiteth for the LORD more than they that watch for the morning: I say, more than they that watch for the morning
- B. What is not waiting on the LORD?
 - 1. one who is not concerned about God & salvation is not waiting on God
 - 2. one who lives in spiritual idleness is not waiting on God
 - 3. one who lives "I am waiting and hoping for the best" is not waiting on God
- C. What is then true waiting upon the LORD?
 - 1. a fruit of the Spirit through which your soul clings to God for salvation a. see Job 6:8; 23:8-10; Is. 26:9; Is. 30:15; 40:31

II. What makes such waiting blessed?

- A. This exercise of waiting fruit of at work (John 6:45)
- B. This exercise of waiting for God will not be in vain
 - 1. Putting your hope upon people is vain: Ps. 146:3-4
 - Putting your hope upon Jehovah Jesus is never in vain

 a. because God will never fail His promises in general Is. 30:15 John 3:15

b. because God will never fail His promises in particular Ps. 27:13; 119:49

Closing Reflections

A. For wise and good reasons God may wait to fulfil His promise (30:18a)

Great faith is when we cannot let Him go even though He answers not a word, or when He puts us of or outside. (Matthew 15:21-28)

For the needy shall not always be forgotten: the expectation of the poor shall not perish forever. (Ps. 9:18)
