- 2. The author of Hebrews teaches that the suffering of the Messiah was fitting. Was this the view of the Disciples during their time with Jesus as well?
 - a. Read Mark 8:31-33, what was Peter trying to do?
 - b. What about after His crucifixion? See Luke 24:18-21.
 - c. When did they realize that the suffering of Christ was actually a good thing? See Luke 24:25-27
- 3. Read 1 Corinthians 1:18-25.
 - a. What, or who, are the three groups of people listed in this passage?
 - b. How does each group view the cross?
 - c. What about today, has much changed in the way that people view the cross? Could people still be placed in one of these three categories?
- 4. As we read over Psalm 22, did you pick up on many fulfillments of the prophecy during the crucifixion of Jesus. If so, which ones? Can you connect them to some of the passages at the closing of the gospels?
- 5. One of the key points of Hebrews is that the victory Jesus accomplished through the cross is not enjoyed by Him alone, but all of those for whom He represented. This can be seen in Hebrew 2:10-13 by use of the familial words of solidarity with us used such as: brothers, family, and his children. In a similar way, Romans 5:15-21 and list some other benefits that we receive by Christ representing us.
