D. Rest in God's Deliverance

- POINT 1 - God often allows us woe to help us walk closer to Him.
- POINT 2 - In your woe, don't believe the lie of superstitious past compared to Christ alone.
- POINT 3 - In your woe, don't believe the lie of overwhelming odds compared to Christ alone.
- POINT 4 - In your woe, don't believe the lie that God is not able.
- POINT 5 – Run to God with your woe!
- POINT 6 – At times, following God's way makes your woe worse before it gets better.
- POINT 7 – Pray for deliverance from your woe.
