THE LARGER AND SHORTER CATECHISMS.

HAVING SEEN WHAT THE SCRIPTURES PRINCIPALLY TEACH US CONCERNING GOD, IT FOLLOWS TO CONSIDER WHAT THEY REQUIRE AS THE DUTY OF MAN

QUESTIONS # 160 & 90.

(Larger Catechism)

Q #160. What is required of those that hear the word preached?

A. It is required of those that hear the word preached, that they attend upon it with diligence,¹ preparation,² and prayer;³ examine what they hear by the scriptures;⁴ receive the truth with faith,⁵ love,⁶ meekness,⁷ and readiness of mind,⁸ as the word of God;⁹ meditate,¹⁰ and confer of it;¹¹ hide it in their hearts,¹² and bring forth the fruit of it in their lives.¹³

(Shorter Catechism)

Q #90. How is the Word to be read and heard, that it may become effectual to salvation?

A. That the Word may become effectual to salvation, we must attend thereunto with diligence, 14 preparation, 15 and prayer; 16 receive it with faith and love, 17 lay it up in our hearts, 18 and practice it in our lives 19

Question 1—What is required of those who hear before they hear or read?

Answer—The Word of God must attended to and understood in order to be effectual, Acts 8:30. Therefore, the Scriptures ought to be attended to, whether in the reading or hearing of the Word preached, with that diligence which characterizes those desirous of gaining wisdom, Prov. 8:34.

First, it is necessary that those who would hear this Word with the hearing of faith attend it with a due preparation, Luke 8:18. Therefore, we must, like Jacob, prepare

ourselves for the reception of the ordinances, Gen. 35:2, 3. This preparation should consist in the following: 1.) Impressing upon one's heart a sense of the majesty and holiness of that God into whose presence we are going and whose Word we are hearing, Ps. 89:6. Though the voice is upon the earth, the speaker is in heaven, and we should consider that so as to come to hear what God has to say, Acts 10:33. The more we cherish this impression, the more good we may expect from his hand, Isa. 66:2. 2.) Banishing out of our hearts those worldly cares that are at other times lawful, Matt. 13:7, 22. We ought to say to these cares, as Abraham to his servants, abide here, Gen. 22:5. 3.) Making application of the blood of Christ to the soul for removing guilt and putting away the enmity between us and God, Amos 3:3. We must approach the altar of the Lord with clean hands, Ps. 26:6. 4.) All of those spiritual obstacles to a right hearing, carnal and corrupt lusts and affections, must be laid aside so that there will be a stirring up and profitableness in the Word of God, 1 Pet. 2:1, 2.

Additionally, this diligence and preparation, especially because it respects spiritual instruction, must all be undergirded with prayer for enlightenment, Ps. 119:18. Just as the preaching of the Word of God must be accompanied with prayer for freedom and faithfulness of utterance, Eph. 6:18, 19; so, too, men stand in need of the blessing of God upon that Word that they might be turned from darkness to light, Acts 26:18. Therefore, we ought to pray: 1.) For assistance to the minister, 2 Thess. 3:1. 2.) For a blessing to ourselves, that God would direct the Word to our case and use, John 9:39. 3.) For the outpouring of the Spirit in these ordinances, according to the promise of the Lord, Prov. 1:23.

Question 2—What is required of those who hear going along with the hearing or reading?

Answer—It is required of those who hear the Word that they examine that according to the Scriptures, Acts 17:11. All right hearing and reading must be to receive the truth with:

First, that faith due the truth of God, as drinking water out of the wells of salvation, Heb. 4:2. This must be a faith of assent to the truth and righteousness of the precepts, promises and threatenings, Ps. 119:128, 160. Faith receives this truth as having the divine authority of God's own testimony, Ps. 19:7. The power of faith in this truth captivates the soul into the belief of it, 2 Cor. 10:5. By faith, men receive the kingdom of God as little children, Luke 18:17. Faith also makes application of this truth to ourselves, Job 5:27. Wherefore, the Word of God is compared to falling rain, Deut. 32:2; and the soul to a thirsty ground, Ps. 143:6.

Second, that love of that truth, as the means of salvation, 2 Thess. 2:10. Faith receives that Word as true, but love receives that Word as good for us, Isa. 39:8. There are three ways we ought to love this Word: 1.) With a love of esteem, Job 23:12. 2.) With a love of desire, Ps. 19:10. 3.) With a love of complacency, Ps. 119:162.

Third, that meekness with respect to that truth which lays aside all self-trust or reliance, Jas. 1:21. It is in meekness that we find divine guidance and instruction, Ps. 25:9.

Fourth, that readiness of mind wherein there is a disposition to receive that Word, Acts 17:11. Those so disposed will receive that Word with gladness unto salvation, Acts 2:41.

Finally, with the firm persuasion that it is indeed the very Word of God, 1 Thess. 2:13. It is this persuasion that ought to move us to assemble unto the hearing of that Word, Acts 13:44.

Question 3—What is required of those who hear after they hear or read?

Answer—Those who hear or read this Word ought to do several things upon hearing it:

First, there should be a meditating upon it, Ps. 1:2. We stand in need that this Word is allowed to sink down in our souls, whereby we might be profited, Luke 9:44. In so doing, we are enabled to take firmer hold upon the truth that it does not slip away, Heb. 2:1.

Second, there should be a conferring, or discussing, of the truth of this Word throughout each day, Deut. 6:6, 7. The repeating and discussing of the truth of the Word is of great delight to those who believe, Luke 24:14. In this repetition, there is often to be found more delight in it than when the truth was first proposed, Prov. 6:22.

Third, there should be a laying it up in our hearts, as a precious treasure, Col. 3:16. Through this hiding, or laying up, our hearts and memories become storehouses of this Word, Prov. 2:1. This, then, becomes a stay keeping us from sinning against the Lord, Ps. 119:11.

Fourth, there should be an endeavoring to put into practice, or bringing forth the fruit thereof, in our lives, Luke 8:15. The Word heard but not reduced to practice leaves men with a greater guilt and offense before God, Jas. 1:25.
