INTRODUCTION

- James has given practical reasons not to do so (i.e. God's choice of the poor, the oppression by the rich)
- Now he moves to the Scriptural reasons
- James has given direction what not to do, how not to behave
- So what are we to do? How are we to act toward those that we have a tendency toward partiality and prejudice (of whatever sort)? And why?

THE ROYAL LAW

8 If you really fulfill the *royal law*according to the Scripture,

"You shall love your neighbor *as yourself,*" •Matthew 22:39
you are doing well.

•Romans 13:7-10

9 But if you show partiality, you *are* committing sin and are *convicted by the law* as transgressors.

THE WHOLE LAW	
10 For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become	
accountable (guilty) for all of it.	
11 For he who said, "Do not commit adultery," also said, "Do not murder."	
If you do not commit adultery but do murder, you have become a transgressor of the law.

THE LAW OF LIBERTY	
12 So <i>speak</i> and so <i>act</i>	
as those who are to be judged under the <i>law of liberty</i> .	
13 For judgment is without mercy to one who has shown no mercy.	
Mercy triumphs over judgment.

RESPONSE	
Obedience is responsive to, never meritorious for, God's grace, The manifest evidence of mercy to us is our mercy toward	
others	
Part of learning to show mercy is realizing everyone is living a storied life - not blind fate, not Karma, not equal deserving	
 We are dealing with complex human beings living in a world where a single day, a turn of events, or deep histories can 	
have devastating consequences • People are never merely what they appear, but so much	
more - so show mercy because of the mercy you have been shown (and not deserved)
