When Samuel was weaned, he was old enough to be left with Eli, for the service of the tabernacle...When the Persian ambassador was in England, he attributed to the custom of early weaning the greater forwardness of our children in mental acquirements than those of his own country, where male children are often kept to the breast till three years of age...The practice is nearly the same in other Asiatic countries. In India the period is precisely three years...When the child is weaned, the Persians make 'a great feast,' to which friends and relations are invited..."

He thinks it very hard in her, and knows not what she means by her seeming cruelty...and sometimes she also weeps at the importunity of his dear looks, and big tears, and stretched out hands. But it must be done, and therefore, though she pities, she perseveres; and after a while he is soothed and satisfied, forgets the breast, and no longer feels even a hankering after his former pleasure."
