Elijah and Obadiah

1 Kings 18:1-18

I. PREVAILING CONDITIONS

- A. It had been a long time. (v. 1)
 - **1. Waiting for the Lord requires** <u>faith</u>. (Num 23:19; Hab 2:3). God will surely do what He says.
 - a. We should remain faithful.
 - b. We should keep our <u>eyes on the Lord</u>, waiting for His next direction.
 - **2.** Acting at the proper time requires <u>discernment</u>. (Jn 7:6-8; Mat 26:45-46)
 - **3.** One course of action is not <u>always</u> <u>appropriate</u> in <u>every</u> situation. (Ecc 3:1, 7; Jer 10:23)
- **B.** The famine was severe. (vs. 2, 5)
 - **1. Horses**—military strength; compromising national security
 - **2. Mules**—commercial infrastructure; transportation, trade

II. POSITIONS OF INFLUENCE

- A. Conflicting Characters
 - 1. <u>Jezebel</u>
 - a. A religious zealot
 - b. A brutal tyrant
 - Obadiah—in charge of king's household; important administrative position
 - **a.** A <u>brave</u> believer (vs. 3-4)— a man of conscience
 - **b. A frightened** human being (vs. 9, 12, 14)
- **B. Providential Assignment**
 - 1. Employed by a wicked government

- **a.** <u>Integrity in Office</u>—honesty and public trust (Dan 6:3-4; Lk 3:12-14)
- **b.** <u>Fear of God</u>—ultimate allegiance (v. 3; Dan 6:5, 10; Acts 5:29)
- **2. Helping God's people** (Gen 41:57 & 50:20; Est 4:14)
 - a. God's servants are <u>strategically placed</u> everywhere to assist His people.
 - **b.** Every position of authority God gives us is <u>at His service</u>. (Col 3:23-24)

III. POINTING THE FINGER (vs. 17-18)

- A. Ahab accuses Elijah of causing trouble for Israel.
 - 1. He <u>challenges</u> the nation's idolatry
 - 2. He <u>delivers</u> God's message
 - 3. He imposes the drought (Js 5:17)
 - The one who opposes you might be standing between you and total destruction!
- **B.** Elijah redirects the blame to Ahab. (v. 18)
 - 1. He has <u>abandoned</u> the LORD. (Deut 29:23-26)
 - **2.** He has <u>followed</u> the Baals. (Deut 6:12-15)—spiritual adultery
- C. Sin has consequences.
 - 1. It is not the one who <u>rebukes</u> but the one who <u>sins</u> who has caused the trouble.
 - 2. If we abandon the LORD, we abandon the source of blessing.
