¹² Zacharias was troubled when he saw *the angel*, and fear gripped him. ¹³ But the angel said to him, "**Do not be afraid, Zacharias, for your petition has been heard**, and your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will give him the name John. (Luke 1:11-13)

The Answered Prayer

What petition is the angel talking about (verse 13)?

Zacharias would have offered a prayer to God as he was offering the incense. It is not likely that he was praying for a personal request but rather praying for the nation, probably the redemption of Israel and the coming of the Messiah. But the angel mentions the birth of a son to him and it would seem implied that that too had been a prayer of Zacharias' as well.

The Response

How did Zacharias respond to the encounter with the angel Gabriel?

He was afraid in the beginning and unbelieving in the end (verses 12 and 18).

The Consequence

What was the consequence of Zacharias' response to this encounter?

He was mute and maybe even deaf until the birth of his son, John the Baptist. (verse 20; see also verse 62)

The Application

We must fight the temptation to define the 'present' by the 'packaging.' - Luther's Blatant but "Good" Sin in joining the Monastery

On July 17, 1505, Martin Luther entered the monastery in Erfurt, Germany to become an Augustinian monk in the Roman Catholic church. He later said this choice was a flagrant sin – "not worth a farthing" because it was made against his father and out of fear. Then he added "But how much good the merciful Lord has allowed to come of it!" (Piper quoting)

We must not think that perfect love does not lie behind our experience of life in a fallen world and therefore, our experience of sin – ours and others – to one degree or another. Think of the sin against Joseph, Paul and Jesus and how all of these involved God keeping His promises and answering the heart's desire and prayers of His people.

Rejoice, Thank, and Pray

So if we believe this, what should we do?

• Corrie ten Boom and her sister were in a concentration camp in WWII. The barracks they lived in were filled with bugs. Corrie's sister said they must thank God for the bugs. At first she refused. But she soon realized they were a blessing. The soldiers would not come into the barracks because of the bugs. Thanking God in trust is what the gospel calls us to in time of trial.
