Scripture: Deut. 5:1-21 & Nehemiah 1 - 2:11

Psalters: 161:1, 5, 6 – 438:3 – 385:1-3 – 359:1-2 – 393:1, 3 – 368:1, 4, 5

Intro: Are you tempted to skip 1 Chronicles 1-9 in your Bible reading?

- A. Scripture records inspiring examples of great leaders for a purpose
- B. Nehemiah stands out and yet his example tends to cause some discomfort
 - 1. His leadership bears as a convicting Christian witness
 - 2. His leadership shows *pro-active* thinking
 - a. he understood the world is never neutral
 - b. he understood the need for *clear boundaries*
 - c. he understood that serving God is more than a worship service

NEHEMIAH'S INSPIRING EXAMPLE FOR OFFICE-BEARERS

I. His Personal Grief II. His Personal Action

I. Nehemiah was a man of personal integrity and fear of God

- A. His personal prosperity did not dim his spiritual focus (1:1-4)
 - 1. He had a brilliant, exciting though spiritually charged position at the court
 - 2. What was the anchor that kept him steadfast?
 - a. He was a man of the *Book* (vs. 7-10)
 - b. He was a man whose desire as to fear the LORD (vs. 11; Prov. 13:13)
 - c. He was a man of personal prayer & fasting (vs. 4)
- B. His reaction to bad & disturbing tidings about Jerusalem is telling!
 - 1. He became exercised spiritually (vs. 4; compare 1:1 and 2:1)
 - 2. He became part of the sin (vs. 6-7)
 - 3. He did not lose his faith in God's promises (vs. 8-11)
- C. Wanted: many more Nehemiah-type Christians!

II. Nehemiah's Personal Action

- A. He was not content to be *mourner* but desired to be a leader (1 Tim. 3:1)
 - 1. Are we praying like Nehemiah: Lord, use me!?
 - 2. Are you prepared for God's answer for may mean huge sacrifices?
- B. As God provided opportunity to do something, he acted decisively (2:1-4)
 - 1. Yet take note *how* he acted (vs. 4b)
 - a. the only safe way to walk with wait upon God as you walk
 - 2. God answered the fervent wrestling of Nehemiah (Nehemiah 2:9-13:31)

FOUR CONCLUDING TAKE-AWAYS ...

- A. Nehemiah led by example and involvement
- B. Nehemiah could not do the work by himself
 - 1. for the King and His Kingdom: *none of His servants can stand idle* a. consider leaders *as* the trellis on which the vine grows
 - b. the real fruit does not grow out of a trellis but out of the vine
- C. Nehemiah used his influence to equip others (Eph. 4:12; Titus 1:5-9)
 - 1. Foremost remains to *take heed to yourselves (first)* (Acts 20:28) a. as leaders aim to be as the sons of Issachar: 1 Chron, 13:32
 - 2. Secondly, we are to give heed to all the flock
 - a. not limited to watching over them
 - b. also means growing them
- D. Being a 'fruitful member' is to live the life of the Kingdom

MATTERS TO CONSIDER AND PRAY ABOUT

- 1. Read through Nehemiah and note in what ways he was opposed though he did a good work. Reflect on your own reaction to spiritual leadership at home, church, school or civil settings, and if needed, seek God's forgiveness. Consider Romans 13:1-7; Titus 2:9-10.
- 2. In the Kingdom of God all saints share the task for the Kingdom life. What is your particular calling within the Kingdom life?
- 3. Paul often referred to himself as the 'servant of Jesus.' How alive is this 'new identity' in you?
