Why are Church Prayer Meetings Important?

- I. Because God does life-changing, kingdom strengthening and kingdom expanding feats in response to the corporate prayers of the saints
 - A. The Spirit is Poured Out Upon the Church and 3,000 Souls are Saved in Response to Prayer (Acts 1:12–14; Cf. 2:1–4)
 - B. The Church is Granted Boldness to Continue Preaching the Gospel in the Midst of Satanic Persecution in Response to Prayer (Acts 4:23–24, 31)
 - C. Peter is Freed from Prison in Response to Prayer (Acts 12:7)
 - D. Missionaries are Chosen and Sent out in Response to Prayer (Acts 13:1–3; Cf. Eph 3:20)
 - E. The First Church in Europe was Born in Response to a Women's Prayer Meeting (Acts 16:13–15)
 - F. One of the greatest things God is pleased to do in response to prayer is foster unity among His saints
