# **Rizpah: Sacrificed for Social Justice**

(2 Samuel 21:1-14)

## I. THE DEMAND FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE ()

- A. <u>The Sins of The Fathers</u> (Ex 20:5; Rom 5:14; 1 Cor 15:22)
  - **1. The Guilt of the Race** *Corporate identity, racial tensions*
  - 2. The Heads of State—*Representative of the Nation*
- B. <u>Crimes Against God and Man</u>—Collective Outrage
  - **1. Violating an Ancient Treaty** (Josh 9)—*Joshua's treaty with Gibeon*
  - **2. Attempting Ethnic Cleansing** ()—*Saul's slaughter of the Gibeonites*
- C. <u>The Good of the Many</u> ()—*individual rights versus national interest*
- D. <u>The Sacrifice to Atone</u>—seven of Saul's male descendents
  - 1. <u>To Explate Guilt</u> (Heb 9:22)—pay for the wrong that was done
  - 2. <u>To Reconcile Parties</u> (Eph 2:16; Col 1:20)
    - a. Offense against <u>God</u>—the broken vow
    - **b.** Offense against a <u>People</u>—one group against another
  - **3.** <u>**To Restore Creation**</u> (Rom 8:22)—*end drought, return the blessing*

### II. THE LOSS OF A CHILD

- A. <u>The Grief of the Mothers</u>—Life outside of Eden is full of grief.
- B. <u>The Injustice of Justice</u>—Someone needs to pay, but we can't punish the right person.

### III. THE HOPE OF THE GOSPEL

- A. <u>The Sacrifice of Jesus Christ</u>—the only man who can atone for the race
  - 1. Willing (Mat 20:28; Jn 10:18; 12:27; Eph 5:2) He laid down His life.

**2. Qualified** (1 Tim 2:5; Heb 7:27-28; 1 Pet 1:19; Rev 5:1-5) — The perfect lamb without blemish or defect; Son of Adam and *divine Son of God*; Himself the injured party

- **3. Effective** (Acts 17:31; Heb 7:23-25) *Resurrection shows His sacrifice has been accepted*.
- B. <u>The Reconciliation of Races</u> (Acts 10:34-35; Rom 10:12-13; 1 Cor 12:13; Gal 3:28; Eph 2:14-22; 1 Pet 2:9-10)
  - **1. Christian Unity**—*objective reality*
  - 2. Christian Practice—the power of forgiveness and love
- C. <u>The Coming of Shalom</u> (Isa 11:2-9; 32:15-18; 65:25; Rev 21:1-4; 22:1-5)—It's coming! Wait for it!
  - **1. Peace on Earth**—they will beat their swords into plow shears
  - The Healing of All Creation—There will be no more drought or famine or scarcity of any kind.

#### Read 2 Samuel 3:7 and 21:1-14; Job 16:11-17:3.

- 2. List all the things you can see that are *not fair* about Rizpah's life.
- 3. Although she is a widow, what would be the political implications if General Abner *had*, in fact, slept with her?
- 4. How does Rizpah end up losing both of her sons?
- 5. How is Rizpah a catalyst for reconciliation, both nationally and in the life of David?
- 6. How is Rizpah's experience similar to the experience of Mary the Mother of Jesus?
- 7. Dealing with grief:
  - a.) How does Rizpah deal with her grief as a bereft mother?
  - b.) What are some other ways she *might* have chosen to responded?
  - c.) What are some ways that people today process their grief (positive or negative)?
- 8. Loss and grief are universal to the human condition.
  - a.) How can we as Christians grieve well?
  - b.) How can we be sensitive and helpful to those who are grieving?
- 9. How does Jesus answer the cries of a grieving mother? (See Isaiah 53:4; Luke 7:12-16; Romans 8:28, 35-39.)
- 10. How does Jesus bring hope to the story of Rizpah?
