-Author: Paul the apostle and Sosthenes the brother (1:1)

-Date: from Ephesus ~AD 55-56, about 2-3 years after Paul founded the church (Acts 18:1-19:10)

-Purpose: address problems in the church he had heard about; address questions they had written to him about (1:11; 5:1; 6:1; 7:1; 8:1; 12:1; 15:12; 16:1)

-Miscellaneous Questions: Marriage (7:1-40); Eating Meat Sacrificed to Idols (8:1-10:33); Public Worship (11:1-14:40): [role of women in the church [head coverings (11:1-16); women speaking in church (14:34-36)]; proper observance of the Lord's Supper (11:17-34); proper use of spiritual gifts (12:1-14:40)]; Resurrection from the Dead (15:1-58); Benevolence Collections (16:1-4)
