# **Lesson 17: Power, Compassion & Authority to Heal**

Matthew 8:1-17

## I. THE MAN WITH LEPROSY (1-4; Lk 5:12-16) CHRIST'S COMPASSION

Leprosy represents the curse of sin. Jesus came to cure us of sin and its deadly effects.

- **A. Coming to Jesus**—His determination shows his desperation.
  - **1. His Condition**—"A man with leprosy" / "full of leprosy"
    - a. Unclean—excluded a person from social and religious fellowship with others
    - **b.** Incurable (2 Kg 5:7; Jer 17:9)—Diagnosis was a death sentence.
    - c. Contagious—no known cure in biblical times
    - d. Outcast—Out of concern for public health, infected person banished from society
  - **2. His Fear**—"If you are willing"—would Jesus run away, rebuke him, send him away?
  - **3. His Faith** (Jer 17:14; 2 Kg 5:8)—"You can make me clean"

# **B. Touched by Jesus** (3)

- 1. The Isolation of Suffering (Gen 3:7-8)—shame and fear cause us to withdraw/hide
- **2. The Compassion of Christ** (Mk 1:41; Jn 6:37; 1 Jn 4:18)—ministers to emotional, physical & spiritual need. No one who comes to Jesus will ever be turned away!
- **3. The Beauty of Incarnation** (Heb 2:17-18 & 4:15-16)—God became man so that He could touch us and we could touch Him!
- C. <u>Instructed by Jesus</u> (4)—the cleansed leper did not obey Jesus' instructions
  - **1. The Secrecy** (Mk 1:45)—"Don't tell anyone."
    - a. The crush of crowds
    - b. First things first
  - 2. The Law (Lev 14:1-32)—"Go, show yourself to the priest..."
    - a. The Priest—the Public Health official of Israel, could diagnose, quarantine, banish
    - **b.** The Offering—priest's wage and thanksgiving to God
  - The <u>Witness</u>—"As a testimony to them"
    - **a. Verification of the Miracle**—priest would verify & document the miracle and authorize the former leper's re-entry to the community
    - b. Testimony to the Priests—that Jesus fulfills OT, should recognize Messiah

## II. THE ROMAN CENTURIAN (5-13; Luke 7:1-10) CHRIST'S AUTHORITY

- **A.** A Surprising Faith—stronger than any Jesus found among His own people
  - 1. A Gentile of Righteous Character—loved the Jews, built their synagogue
  - 2. Conscious of His Unworthiness—not a natural heir of the promise
  - 3. Confident in Christ's Ability—even when not physically present

#### **B.** The Authority of Christ

- **1. Recognition of Authority**—a military man recognizes authority
- **2. Submission to Authority**—humbly appeals to Christ for help
- **3.** Use of Authority—for the benefit of those under his authority, a reflection of Christ

#### **C.** A Place at the Table (Isa 25:6-9; Rom 9:30-32)

- 1. The Kingdom of Heaven
  - a. International (Gen 12:3; Jn 10:16)—Gentiles (all nations) always in God's plan
  - **b. Spiritual** (Jn 6:63 & 8:39-40, 56)—qualification is faith, not flesh (works or biology)
- 2. The Tables Are Turned
  - a. Inside Feasting with Abraham (11)—Many Gentiles will come—the welcome
  - b. Outside Weeping in Darkness (12)—Many natural Jews thrown out—the refusal

#### III. DEMONS AND DISEASES (14-17; Isa 53:4) CHRIST'S POWER

- A. Peter's Mother-in-Law (14-15)
  - 1. Bringing Jesus Home with You—Jesus not just for the crowds, also for your family
  - 2. Serving out of Gratitude—not to earn favor but because you have received favor
- B. The Human Condition (16)—oppressed by devil; deformities/diseases of body & soul
  - 1. Spiritual Illness—He drove out evil spirits
  - 2. Physical Illness—He healed all the sick
- C. Isaiah's Prophecy (17; Isa 53:4)
  - 1. Jesus is not afraid of our sins and diseases.
  - 2. We don't make Him sick; He makes us well.
