## Rahab: The God-Fearing Prostitute

(Joshua 2 & 6:15-25)

#### I. THE HOLINESS OF GOD

#### A. The Terror of God's Wrath

- **1.** A Matter of <u>Criminal Justice</u> to protect victims and punish offenders
- **2. A Matter of** Public Health to stop epidemic contagion
- **3. A Function of Love** to protect and defend what is precious
- **4. A Serious Reality** (Jn 3:36; Rom 1:18; Eph 5:5-6; 2 Pet 3:3-7)—He has done it before and He will do it again
- **B.** The Horror of Human Sin (Gen 6:5, 11-13; Lev 18, Deut 18:9-12)
  - **1. Sin as a <u>Moral Issue</u>** (Deut 30:19)—rebellion, transgression; you're guilty and you need *forgiveness*.
  - **2. Sin as a <u>Medical Condition</u>** (Jer 17:9; Ezek 16:30)—disorder, affliction; you're sick and you need *therapy*.
  - **3. Sin as a <u>Catastrophic Corruption</u>**—insidious disorientation and malfunction of every aspect of our being; you're guilty, sick, *helpless*, and *dangerous*; you need forgiveness, healing, *rescue*, and *complete transformation*
- C. The Tragedy of the Human Condition (Gen 3:16-19; Job 14:1; )
  - **1.** <u>Suffering</u> is unavoidable. (Job 5:7 & 14:1; Ecc 4:1-3)
  - **2. <u>Death</u>** is inescapable. (Ps 89:47-48; Ecc 3:18-20)
  - **3.** <u>Evil</u> is insidious. (Rom 8:6-8; Jam 1:14-15)—stealthy, deceptive, treacherous, deadly, spreading
- **II.** THE GOODNESS OF GOD (Ps 145:8-9)
  - A. <u>His Intervention</u> (Gen 18:20; Ps 9:12)—goes to war to save what is precious.
    - 1. He hears the cry of the afflicted.
    - 2. He avenges the blood of the innocent.
      - → Even God's wrath is a severe mercy to preserve humanity.

- B. His Patience (Gen 6-7; Gen 15:16; Mat 13:28-30)—He is slow to anger
  - **1. God <u>warns</u>**. (2 Chron 24:19; Jer 25:4)
  - **2. God gives time to repent.** (Rom 2:4; 2 Pet 3:9)
- **C.** <u>His Mercy</u>—He is kind and compassionate; it is impossible for us to be kinder or more compassionate than He is.
  - **1.** He <u>saves some</u>. (Gen 18:32; 2 Pet 2:9) *the righteous, the repentant* (*Not* racism or genocide; but eradication of rampant, localized, concentrated evil)
  - **2.** He does not hold our <u>past</u> against us. (1 Cor 6:9-11) Rahab is remembered for her faith, not her sins; contributed her DNA to the Messiah.

### III. THE PROVISION OF GOD — Jesus Christ, the Savior of the World

- **A.** <u>The Lamb of God</u> (Jn 1:29; Heb 9:22 & 10:19-22)—*the forgiveness of our sins;* He paid the debt and purchased the salvation of everyone who would plead for the mercy of God through Him.
- **B.** <u>The Great Physician</u> (Isa 53:5; Jer 17:9, 14; Ezek 36:25-27; Lk 5:31; 1 Pet 2:24)—*the healing of our souls;* He does for us what we cannot do for ourselves.
- **C.** <u>The Savior of Sinful Women</u> (Mat 21:31-32; Jn 3:36; 1 Tim 1:15)
  - **1. Jesus took the wrath of God for us.** (Isa 53; Mat 26:42; Rom 5:6-11; 1 Cor 5:7 & 15:3; Gal 3:13; Heb 2:9; 1 Pet 2:24; Rev 5:9) Because of His great love, God, Himself, paid for our sin.
  - **2. Jesus brings salvation to people of every race.** (Isa 49:6 & 56:3-8; Acts 10:34-35 & 13:47; Eph 2:11-19) Rahab's salvation a foreshadowing of the gospel
  - **3. Jesus <u>turns no one away</u>**. (Joel 2:32; Rom 10:13; Acts 2:21; Jn 6:37) Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.
